FROM THE PASTOR

17 June 2018

The scripture readings call our attention to various aspects of the **natural world**, which many of us experience more fully in summer activities. The first reading speaks of God planting and nurturing a cedar on a high mountain. The tree will become a home for birds of all kinds. The responsorial psalm describes the righteous person as like a palm tree or a cedar of Lebanon. In the Gospel, Jesus tells two parables that depend on nature imagery: the farmer planting grain and the mustard seed growing into a large plant that also serves as a home for birds.

In the recent months, countless trees in California have been destroyed by wildfires. And around the world, farmers struggle to feed their families and others in the face of increasing droughts, floods and high temperatures that are disrupting the food production system.

Pope Francis has not stopped calling our attention to the moral demand to address climate change. His encyclical "Laudato Si', on "Care for Our Common Home" stands as one of the most comprehensive treatments of the matter and provides a spiritual context for the moral issues it raises.

WEEKLY HOLY HOUR is held at St. Francis Church on Thursdays at 5:30 pm. The Hour of Eucharistic Adoration consists of some quiet time, the praying in common of a portion of the Liturgy of the Hours, prayers for vocations to the priesthood and religious life, and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. We dedicate this one hour each week to prayers for vocations. Everyone is invited to come.

WHAT'S IN YOUR HEART? The readings this week show that what is small, hard to see, and even invisible can have vast importance. Whether it's the tender shoot of the cedar tree or the tiny seed of the mustard plant, what seems slight now will become something mighty. "We walk by faith, not by sight," the Second Letter to the Corinthians says; we hope in that what is unseen and in the future will come to pass. The important thing, though, is to realize how the present still matters. How you tend that invisible seed makes a difference; what you do "at home in the body" now has consequences for when you are at home in the Lord, so "aspire to please him" at all times. Think of the little seeds, shoots, and easy-tomiss places in your life where more attention and cultivation "shall bear fruit," as the psalmist says, in the kingdom of God.

CATHOLIC SCHOOLS across our country are facing many challenges today, mostly due to declining enrollments. All this comes at a time when our society so desperately needs Catholic schools. This is why we are forming a *Memorare Army* and are asking for your prayers. Will you join in praying 100 *Memorares* for an in-

FAITH FORMATION: Church documents call the Christian family the "domestic church." This is both a compliment and a call to commitment. Because the family is a community formed in love and dedicated to the physical and spiritual growth of its members, it is a miniature version of the Kingdom of God on earth. This Sunday's Gospel Reading, Mark 4:26–34, consists of two parables that Jesus used to help us discern the mystery of the Kingdom of God. The beginning of the kingdom is compared to a tiny seed that over time matures and ripens. Many of the things we do within the family seem insignificant. They are part of our daily activity and attract little attention. Yet they show our love and concern for one another. According to the Gospel, it's these small things that yield big results, acting as significant contributions to the growth of God's kingdom on earth. The growth of the seed illustrates the nature and the results of a strong faith.

Read aloud together the Gospel of Mark 4:26 –34. Consider how your family's concerns reflect the Church's concerns for those members who are poor, forgotten, hungry, ill, shunned, or lonely. Together think of a specific action that you can do to assist a person in your extended family, neighborhood, or parish. Now pray together the Lord's Prayer, pausing briefly to consider the importance of the words "thy kingdom come." Each evening this week as you gather for supper, share with one another the simple acts of love you witnessed within the family that day.

A FATHER'S SIMPLE SERMON: I distinctly recall the day when my faith took firm root. I was 7 years old and my sisters and I had just been summoned by my dad to join him around the kitchen table while my mom fixed him dinner. It was late, around 10 p.m. Dad had been out with his buddies. Sometimes when he came home late he'd have a pack of White Castle sliders to share with us, but this night he just wanted to talk.

"Girls, he said, "I know you're excited about Christmas, but I want to make sure you understand what it all means. I've been thinking about this a lot, and I just want to make sure you get it. "God chose to come to earth as a baby—a tiny newborn baby—not a king, not some mighty warrior who would force us to do his will. No, he chose to come to us as a helpless, needy babe, swaddled and cuddled by his mother and watched over by his father.

"Just think about what that says about who God is: God is a God of love and peace; of tenderness and care. That's the God we believe in. That's the God you want to follow."

And thus my father, like Jesus, spoke in words we could understand, scattered the seeds of faith, and watched it grow in his children. Thanks, Dad, for the most memorable sermon on the Incarnation I've ever heard.




However, visiting with

our neighbor before Mass should take place in the vestibule of the Church. Visiting with God before Mass takes place in the church. Therefore, there can be talking in the vestibule of the church, but there should be quiet and silence before Mass in the church - to give people that reflective time prior to the beginning of Mass.

On November 17th, Pope Francis called out the common habit of chatting with people around us before Mass, stressing that this is a time for silent prayer, when we prepare our hearts for an encounter with the Lord. "When we go to Mass, maybe we arrive five minutes before, and we start to chit-chat with those around us." However, "it is not a moment for chit-chat. It is a moment of silence for preparing ourselves for dialogue, a time for the heart to collect itself in order to prepare for the encounter with Jesus. Silence is so important."

The Pope said that the Mass is not a show, but a place where we encounter the Lord. In this encounter, silence is what "prepares us and accompanies us." Let's spend quiet moments before Mass, awaiting the coming of the Lord in the Eucharist.
